EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Mount Auburn Cemetery in Cambridge, MA is in the process of filling two exciting and challenging positions, **Vice President of Horticulture & Landscape** and **Facilities Maintenance Specialist**. Vice President of Horticulture & Landscape. The Vice President of Horticulture & Landscape (VPHL) is responsible for visionary and inspirational leadership and effective management of the Horticulture Department, with three direct reports (Superintendent of Grounds, Horticultural Curator, and Wildlife Conservation & Sustainability Manager) and a total departmental staff of 17 full-time and 34 seasonal (including internships) positions and a departmental budget currently at \$2.2 million.

The VPHL is responsible for the design and implementation of landscape improvements that achieve long-term strategic objectives such as increasing plant diversity, enhancing the sustainability and wildlife habitat value of the landscape, and preserving the historic character of this 175-acre “National Historic Landmark” and Level III accredited arboretum, which has over 5,000 trees and more than 20,000 plants overall, representing 115 different botanical families and comprising more than 2,000 different taxa.

Facilities Maintenance Specialist. The Facilities Maintenance Specialist is responsible for routine maintenance of mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems in all Cemetery structures. Must have general knowledge of plumbing, heating, cooling, and electrical systems as well as basic building repair, carpentry and painting skills. Works with Vice President of Preservation and Facilities in coordinating contracted work on all Cemetery structures.

On October 10th the Association held their Fall meeting at The Derryfield in Manchester, NH. Seventy attendees heard a presentation by the NH Municipal Association which will be conducting future annual cemetery trustee training. The training had been provided by Terry Knowles, NH Department of Justice, Corporate Trusts for many years but Terry recently retired.

The second part of the biannual members' meeting was a lively panel discussion on the public's awareness of cemeteries and working with funeral directors. The NHCA Board met on January 23rd to plan the 2019 Spring meeting which will be held on April 3rd at The Derryfield.

49TH FREDERICK LAFFOND SEMINAR



Just like Superman, David Boyle emerged from a phone booth this past December 3rd to deliver a lively, thought provocative program at the 49th Frederick Laffond Cemetery Management Seminar in Sturbridge, MA. Over 65 cemetarians and suppliers gathered at the Publick House Historic Inn and Country Lodge for the three day learning event.

Monday's afternoon program included representatives from MassCor at Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Corrections. MassCor offers many products that are produced by the inmates which are available to your cemetery.

Following MassCor, UMass graduate Michael Stachowicz talked about the challenges he encounters as the Turf Management Specialist of the National Park Service. Michael oversaw the reconstruction of the National Mall and has worked with various parks across the US to improve and protect their cultural landscapes.

Are the memorials within your cemetery a liability? Joe Swift believes that we need to recognize that these monuments and markers are an easement on your property. He emphasized the need to recognize this expense and to collect an appropriate fee to be deposited into an endowment fund to insure the proper maintenance of these memorials into perpetuity.

Tuesday began with David Ward offering creative ways to utilize odd spaces within your cemetery to meet the growing demand for the memorializing of cremated remains. One example he highlighted was the development of an area within Oaklawn Cemetery in Fairfield, CT. This included a uniquely designed columbaria involving a curved radius that created a challenge for Jeff Hardy, Hardy Doric/ KMI Columbaria. It is encouraging to see one of our members employing the services of our supplier member firms.



Have you considered alkaline hydrolysis as an alternative to cremation? Joseph Wilson, CEO of Bio-Response Solutions explained why perhaps you should. His informative presentation was eye-opening and created a lot of discussion.

Geno Merendino, Chief Gardener for Merendino Cemetery Care again delighted us with an energetic, thought provocative discussion on how he motivates his employees. By encouraging them to become invested in the task at hand he finds that they are more responsive to customer service through innovation.

Another friend was on hand to encourage us to be more professional in our daily operations. Attorney Poul Lemasters provided examples where funeral homes and cemeteries found themselves in legal troubles, usually due to the lack of detail in their operations. While his presentation was part horror show it most certainly caused us to take note of all of the small, little things we must do to protect ourselves in today's litigious society.



As usual, the gathering of friends and associates in the evening, before and after dinner, was perhaps the most informative. Where else do you have an opportunity to discuss the daily issues involved in the running of a modern cemetery or a historical site. Of even more benefit is an opportunity to discuss an unusual, important issue with a peer who has perhaps

experienced the issue or can bring a fresh perspective to the problem.

So if you missed the 2018 seminar you must plan to attend the 2019 event. It will again be held at the Publick House in Sturbridge, December 9th through the 11th. Chair, Mary Anne Hawthorne is already at work scheduling exciting speakers who will again provide us with timely, informative programs that are certain to be useful in your daily management and preparations for your cemetery's future. This program is always worth its weight in gold and a true bargain.
