The 117th Annual Meeting of the New England Cemetery Association was held at the Trapp Family Lodge, in Stowe, Vermont from June 24th to June 27th. President James Holman and the Board of Directors hosted a wonderful, informative and inspiring program for the benefit of the membership.

Presenting next was Kirk Smith sharing his experiences in developing and promoting the Memorial Path within the 200 year old churchyard cemetery of The Village Church in Wellesley, Massachusetts. Prior to 2007 there had been no interments in the cemetery for over 100 years when a 10 foot wide path through the cemetery was identified. This area was developed to accommodate shared burial spaces for cremated remains with memorials engraved on shared monuments.

Completing the day was our friend from Mount Auburn, David Barnett. Dave shared with us how Mount Auburn has met many of the challenges created by the maintenance and management of a well established cemetery. He illustrated how they utilized plant species to eliminate mowing of grass on difficult terrain. Not only did these changes improve the appearance of the cemetery, but they also created opportunities for the memorializing of cremated remains.

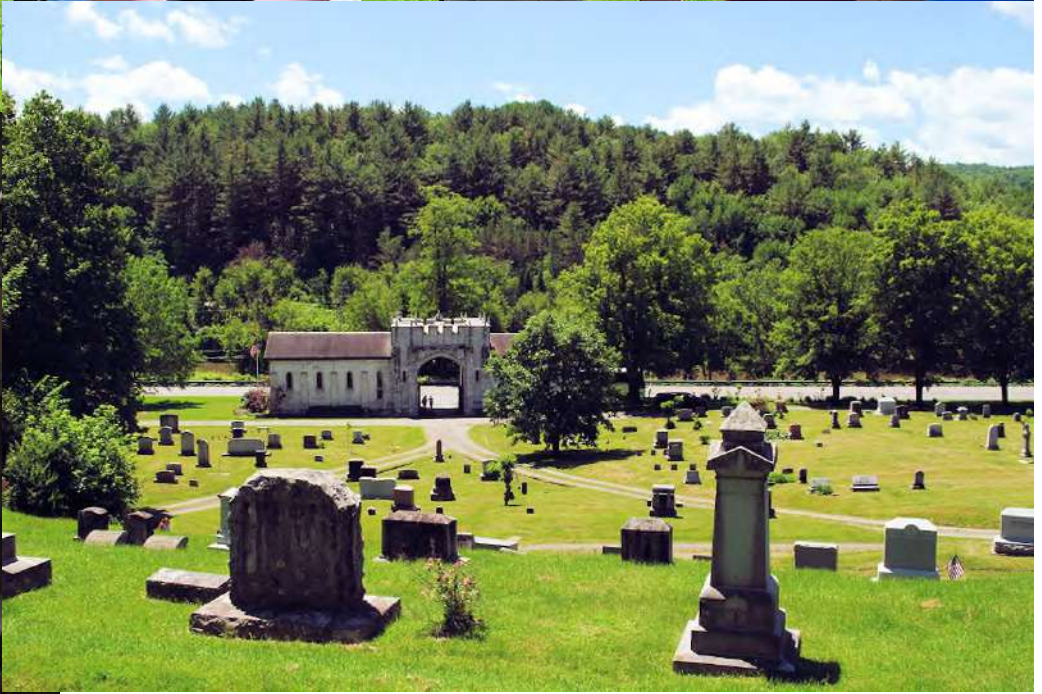
